Note from Tom Hawks- Stewardship



Speaking for myself, and I assume many of you, being a member of SLC is a reward unto itself and a blessing with which we are handsomely endowed. During my brief talk to the congregation I attempted to personalize and publish how lucky we are to have so many talented people injecting life and meaning into the church's offerings. Also, I urged our members to get in touch with this fabulous dynamic and transform those feelings into tangible contributions to the continued operation of SLC.

A few weeks ago, I prepared a letter to each of our members and informed them of the annual decrease in contributions we experience each year at the end of the second quarter. Traditionally, this drop has been significant and makes the budgeting activities necessary to keep things running on an even keel (love that Navy jargon).

From Marietta - Pastoral Intern and Small Groups Coordinator

Dear SLC,

I am so thankful to have been joyfully welcomed back into your midst. I'm wearing a few different hats these days at SLC, so read along and hopefully my new duties will be clear.

In August last year, I began in the job of small groups connector. In this position (10 hours a week) I am tasked with organizing small group ministry. Last fall, I worked with congregational leaders as we formed a plan for small group ministry and trained new leaders, along with supporting SLC's existing small groups. Our theme was focused around a passage in John 1:

"When Jesus turned and saw (the disciples) following, he said to them, "What are you looking for?" They said to him, "Rabbi, "where are you staying?" He said to them, "Come and see."

Come - See - Connect became our mantra. Sign-ups for groups were held in February and the 11 new small groups launched toward the end of the month. Between participation in the new groups and some people joining existing groups, we had more than 70 people involved in Bible studies, discussions about faith, exercise, fellowship and mission. Some of these groups met for eight weeks and others continue to meet now. We are thankful for the leaders who were willing to step forward for this ministry, as well everyone else involved in small groups at SLC. We are making plans for the fall to launch another small group effort.









A second hat is my job as SLC's pastoral intern. As a distance learner at Wartburg Theological Seminary (based in Dubuque, Iowa), I am learning to become a pastor in the ELCA. My course of study requires an internship in a congregation. In this position, I will be doing pastor-y things: Bible study, leading worship, preaching and pastoral care. This time as an intern at SLC is precious - it's where we students get to put into practice the things we learn in class. And the congregation is a partner in my learning.

A group of congregation members currently serve as my internship committee. We meet every six weeks. When I preach, I may ask some of you to fill out sermon evaluation forms. (These are shared with my seminary professors.) They will help me become a better preacher. Pastor Bill is my main supervisor, with Pastor Paula and Pastor Jonathan lending their expertise, too.



A third hat that I continue to wear as I am the small groups connector/pastoral intern is that of full-time graduate student. My course of study at Wartburg involves continuing to take classes as I work in the church. So once in awhile, you might find a sticky note on my door at church that says, "In Class Right Now." Just come back to visit me later.

Again, I am so thankful to be back among the people of SLC. It's interesting that this newsletter begins with President David Soine writing about Darlene (Pomerenk) Britt. Guess who welcomed me and my then 1-year-old son, Ian, through the doors of SLC in February, 1995? Yes, indeed, it was Darlene. Thanks be to God for her, for all those saints who have come before us, and all of those around us now.

A Note from Kim Grasmick, Evangelism/OutReach

We launched Sacred Grounds, our 2nd service coffee ministry on March 25th, 2018. Over the year, attendance has steadily grown and about 5 individuals and families have faithfully stepped up to be hosts. The purpose of this coffee time is twofold: of course, it is a great time for our church family to gather and fellowship, but it is also an intentional opportunity for us to welcome guests.

It is an important part of our welcoming ministry – when we notice visitors after worship, we can use Sacred Grounds as a conversation starter, welcoming them and shepherding them to coffee, where those gathered can help the visitor to feel at home.





It is vital for us to acknowledge each visitor so that they feel welcome and are invited to return. Even if you're shy, all that needs to be said is, "Good morning, it's nice to see you today. How long have you worshipped with us? I hope you enjoyed the service – please join us for coffee and snacks next door at the Fellowship Hall." It is as simple as that – and even gets you off the hook if

the person is a long-time member of the church, but you just don't know him or her!




From July 19-28 the high schoolers will take part in Silverdale Lutheran Youth 2019
