My prayer as we finish 2015 is that as Christ's body, we will not be comfortable with where we are at. I pray we can embody the Apostle Paul's commitment when he says, "I press on towards the goal." SLC by most measures is doing very well. Financial giving continues to grow. Worship attendance went up slightly again this year. When we look at how most churches are doing in our area, growth in these areas is saying something. Our Sunday School continues to be a vital part of our ministry and our Adults continue to fill the Social Hall on Sunday mornings to learn and grow in their faith. Our youth ministry is strong. Our Care ministry is supporting many and service and fellowship ministries abound. When Bishop Jaech visited back in the spring and asked us to share with him about the ministries of SLC, I was amazed at all the things that were bought up and celebrated.

NCD - "Natural Church Development"

The surveys we took in the past continue to give direction and focus to the efforts of your pastors and staff. We will probably wait another year before we do another survey. We will continue to work on our minimum factor and sub areas that NCD showed are areas of growth like our devotional practices, personal evangelism, and study of God's word.

Staff

We continue to try and improve individually and as a team. Pastor Jonathan has returned from his sabbatical with excitement and new energy starting a new program ministry called "The Middle" which has really taken off. We are extremely blessed to have Bruce Kramer as our new Office Manager. Bruce has amazing experience in management (former Naval Fire Department Chief) and has hit the ground running. I'm learning a lot from him and have total confidence in his abilities. It is amazing what Pastor Paula does in her ½ time Call – check out her report. Darcy, Lynn, Lisa, Carissa, & Bill all work tirelessly to make our ministry strong. We have a great team.

Sabbatical Plan and Purpose

As most of you know by now, after many months of hard work on a sabbatical grant application, I was blessed to receive an amazing clergy renewal grant of just under \$50,000 from the Lilly Foundation. I'm so thankful to my Mutual Ministry Committee, the Church Council, and other individuals who helped me on the grant. These grants are very difficult to get and I pray it will be a tremendous blessing to SLC and my leadership here. SLC should see this gift as a tremendous affirmation of its ministry. The Title of the grant is, "Long Term Pastor Booster and Size Barrier Buster." This title says in a nut shell what the grant is all about.

Long Term Pastor Booster

I'm 1/3 of the way through my 9th year at SLC. Long term pastorates can be very helpful for congregations when the pastor doesn't go into "comfort mode" or burn out but leverages the trust and respect built up over the years to challenge and move the congregation into greater faithfulness and commitment. I want to be a good steward of the trust and support you have in me as your lead pastor. We have a great fit! My time away will give me rest and space to grow in my leadership skills so when I return I will be a more effective lead pastor—a more effective teacher, preacher, and leader especially when it comes to oversight of staff in a larger congregation and with evangelism.

Size Barrier Buster

For many years now, I've been pointing out in my Annual Reports that SLC keeps bumping up against a size barrier of 350-400 in average worship. The grant includes money to bring in a consultant in the spring that will help us explore what might be preventing us from moving beyond this size ceiling. He will help us look at practical things and also deeper systems and beliefs that might be averting further growth. He will do a day retreat with the Council and other leaders as well as be the key note presenter for our spring Lay School. I will take the learnings from his visit with me on my sabbatical. Moreover my reading when it comes to leadership will focus on two books, both written by Susan Beaumont, a writer, consultant, coach, and spiritual director. Beaumont is an Alban author, and former Senior Consultant with the Alban Institute: The books studied will be, Inside the Large Congregation and When Moses Meets Aaron - Staffing and Supervision in Large Congregations.

The Specifics

Of the \$50,000, \$15,000 of that will go to move Pastor Paula to full time during my absence and cover some of the costs of the consultant. The other \$35,000 will go toward travel, lodging, tuition, books, seminars, etc. My travel will include a trip to England and Germany—and the grant includes funds for my family to join me. In England I will attend special leadership event at a congregation in Sheffield that is doing amazing things. In Germany, I will be host pastor for Wittenberg English Ministries and will conduct services in both Luther's Castle and City churches in Wittenberg while taking side trips to other important Luther sites. My time in Germany will prepare me to come back and teach a series of classes on the Reformation as we draw near to the 500th anniversary. I will also go to Africa, Ethiopia or Namibia, to experience the rapid growth of the church in those countries and be blessed by their worship and study of God's word as well as learn much regarding how they are reaching outward and making disciples. I'm getting the specifics set now on these trips. I will also be attending an advanced seminar on the Logos Bible Software program that I use so often in my teaching.

I give thanks to God daily for SLC. It is an amazing privilege to serve here and be a partner with all of you in loving Jesus. I want to give a huge thank you to Rick Cotter who has done an amazing job over his past three terms. Moreover, you all should be very thankful for all your Executive Officers and Council members. I especially want to thank Randy Randolph our new President, who has done a wonderful job in his first year. I give thanks to my wife Sandy who is so supportive and my inspiration. Thank you for your prayers and concern for both Katy and Becca who are doing well outside of the "nest." It's so great to see how you all care and love all the children of your pastors and staff. So on to 2016, can't wait!

Annual Report 2015

Pastor Jonathan Sansgaard

Every ordained pastor in the ELCA, regardless of title or role, is called to serve in four basic areas. I will use those headings to guide my report.

Preaching

We find ourselves in the final year of the Narrative Lectionary four year cycle. This year will offer us the chance to give a holistic evaluation of the cycle, but I know I have enjoyed the opportunity to focus in on particular readings – often ones I have never preached – as well as the chance to see a thread through the Old and New Testaments. We have worked as a preaching team to try and name these threads through the last few years, and I think it has worked well. I continue to enjoy working with Pastors Paula and Bill as I think we help to strengthen one another in our preaching.

Teaching

A better title for this section might be *Faith Formation*, as that is the primary goal of any teaching in my area (and I think my colleagues' as well), and I would begin this once again by saying the primary place for that to happen is in the home. We continue to stress our Stepping Stones ministry, which has focused on parenting in early childhood, giving used Bibles to our grade school families, helping children prepare to receive communion, equipping families for ministry with their middle schoolers, and celebrating our graduates. All of these steps involve families and stress devotions and blessings in the home. This year we have changed some of our middle school and Confirmation ministry, but the emphasis in this area remains the same – the home is the primary place of faith formation (for better or worse) with the church as support.

During my sabbatical this past summer, I got a chance to focus more on the area of faith formation, and am deeply thankful to professors, curriculum gurus, young adults, and old friends helping me reflect on our ministry together. The first conclusion in all of that is...we have a strong congregation. Our adults model lifelong faith formation and deeply invest themselves in the lives of our young people. SLC is especially supportive in the areas of mentoring and giving to the Summer Servant Trips and other youth events. And we have a strong youth presence in worship, where personal connections can strengthen. I think we can be more intentional about nurturing this asset by connecting the generations in specific events throughout the year. While this will not be a specific goal for 2015-16, it is something we will work on as staff this summer.

Another conclusion from sabbatical is the need to focus on the *spiritual* side of faith formation. We can be a bit chilly in the Lutheran church when it comes to practicing our faith out loud, and I am no exception. The best way I can describe this shift in emphasis is that we need to move from knowing about Jesus to knowing Jesus personally. For my part, I am focused on what we offer to our youth, and there are a couple of changes. First, it is clear that a critical time of faith formation comes in middle school. So we have started a new group called the middle, with this mission: for middle schoolers, in the middle of the week, putting Jesus in the middle of their life. We are using curriculum that is focused on our relationship with God and others, but also how we see ourselves through the eyes of God. So far it has been a very successful and well-liked gathering. Some of this has translated to our high school Youth Nights as well. They will be using the same curriculum, again with the focus of building a more personal relationship with the God of Jesus Christ, and how that affects their impact on the world. In past years, we have also had the gift of large classes (12-18 kids), but that has changed. I think that gives us the opportunity to reform our Youth Nights and reach out to other kids who would benefit from being a part of such a special group in a healthy congregation. Part of that may involve moving our Sunday night occasional gatherings to weekly mid-week gatherings in 2016. Already in the middle, and increasingly in the high school, I am seeking to involve more adults. We will also add a Summer Retreat for our middle schoolers, most likely to Lutherhaven in Coeur d' Alene.

The last area in teaching is Confirmation, and there have been changes here too. We have welcomed Anna Quam as a new guide, along with the return of both Pam Rhodes and Brian McGuire. Our curriculum has also changed. We are using something called *re:form*, and it focuses on questions about God, the Bible, and other matters of faith. It also offers interactive projects, art, and group activities. This group will remain 7th-9th grade, but retreats and other activities will now be divided more between middle school and high school.

Worship Leadership

This past year saw an end to our 3rd worship offering, ROOTS. While it did serve the needs of a small population of the church, it ultimately was not sustainable for the resources needed to run it. Pastors and staff will continue to explore if there will be life out of those ashes.

Pastoral Care

I continue to see this as one of my most important areas of ministry. And while I do occasionally have the privilege to supplement Pastors Paula and Bill with visits to the hospital or care facilities, for me this area is more about visits at Bluberry or a school. I continue to coach football at Central Kitsap Middle School, and I have found that to be a great joy and connection with the community. I also continue to have one on one visits with youth, and conversations with families around parenting, developmental changes in their kids, etc. There are times of crisis in the lives of our young people, and we seek to be present as a pastoral team to both our kids and families. I consider our Summer Trips to be a place of pastoral care, as it is often these places where our youth are faced with challenges, questions, or just growth in their faith. This past summer is on many of our kids' lists of "best trip ever," especially considering the impact of our pre-service event with Revolution 313. In all of these times, there is the chance for our faith to become three dimensional, for the learning to grow legs. And I think in these moments of tragedy, conflict, joy, or insight, there is great opportunity to see Christ present.

Sabbatical

The learning is generally covered in the rest of my report, but I am deeply thankful to the congregation for the time I received. I learned much, but most importantly, I got the opportunity to reflect and re-energize. I don't think I knew how mentally tired I was until you gave me a Sabbath to rest.

Annual Report 2015 Pastor Paula Burchill

I will make of you a great nation, and I will bless you, and make your name great, so that you will be a blessing. Genesis 12: 2

As we worked with the council this past year to sum up our mission statement, we came up with Grace-filled...Spirit-led, and I can't think of a more apt way to describe both who we are at SLC and who we are aspiring to become. That phrase really comes out of the promise God made to Abraham and Sarah that he would bless them SO THAT they would be a blessing to others. And as we have been preaching through the narrative lectionary this fall, I have loved the theme of how God continues to bless his people even when they don't deserve it. How even if we reject the blessing, God still gives it, and how God uses anyone he can to get his blessing out to the world.

As pastors we have been trying to be better about teaching you that you are so filled with God's grace that you can't help but be led by the Spirit in your life. And that no matter where you find yourself in your walk with God, God wants to know you better. God wants you to take another step. God has so much blessing to share through you.

So as I share my report, I want to share it as a sharing of blessings that have come through God's grace, and then ask where the Spirit might be continuing to lead us.

<u>Devotion Team</u>: In January of this past year, I got together a group of people to brainstorm how we could help the congregation take the next step and grow in their devotional lives. We defined devotions as "being with God in word and prayer." We used Lent as the time to encourage people to make a commitment to devotions. We ended up with putting together a resource page on the website with all kinds of different ways to be in devotion to God. There are some parts of the group that continue. Michelle Shiplet had an interest sparked in prayer beads—which are in many ways a Lutheran version of the rosary, and a tool for focusing your prayer. We made them at family camp, Ladies Night Out and are considering offering more classes on them in Lent for this coming year.

<u>Trip to Israel</u>: Julie Gillies was on the Devotion Team, and the Spirit led her to look at pilgrimages as a way to grow in faith. She started praying about and dreaming about taking a group from SLC to the Holy Land in 2017. Through much prayer and conversation with others, Julie and I are going to be leading a trip starting in late March of 2017. The trip will be 9 days. We will be traveling with a group called *Faith Based Expeditions*, with whom Pastor Chuck Slocum from Vinland has traveled several times and they come highly recommended. I will be going on a trip with another church in late May early June of 2016 to learn how to lead. The church will only have to pay for my plane ticket [around \$1200, which we will use continuing ed money for]. The leader of Faith-Based Expeditions will be coming at his expense in January of 2016 to answer questions during an adult forum. We expect the trip to cost around \$4000. With every 10 trips booked, we get a free trip.

<u>Women's Ministry:</u> Women's ministry continues to be very important at SLC. Lynn Rupp and I worked together on the women's retreat in February at St. Andrews Retreat Center on the Hood Canal. This year we had 30 women attend and it was the most we have ever had. Our theme was "Listening for God." Next year's retreat dates are Feb. 19-21, 2016.

On November 5, I led our fourth annual one day women's retreat at Seabeck Conference Center. Around 30 women gathered together for a day of learning and worship. Our theme was *Praying the Seasons of our Lives*.

I continue to lead a <u>Moms' Circle</u> on Wednesday mornings in the SLC Study. This year we have moved to meeting from 10:45 to noon. We seem to be reaching more moms from our preschool, so am thankful for that.

One of the reasons for that has been <u>Holy Yoga</u>, which is a ministry I became familiar with a year or so ago. Holy Yoga International is a non-profit 501c3 ministry. The leader offers a class that is donation based, tithing 10% back to the church, and 40% to a ministry for women who were victims of sex trafficking. A woman named Hannah Smith is leading the class for us. It is yoga combined with Bible reflection and prayer. The class meets at 9:30 am on Wednesdays in the Gathering Place. We chose this time so that we could piggy-back on the nursery care we offer for Moms Circle. There have been 15-20 people attending each week. The class is a gentle yoga class.

There has been interest expressed in an evening class for those who are not able to make it during the day. Hannah is going to offer a class Monday evenings at 6:30 pm in the Fellowship Hall. There will not be child care offered. The class will run for 6 weeks to gauge interest. It will be a more intense power class.

<u>Family Ministry:</u> I've made some changes to KFC, Kids for Christ, the youth group for 3rd through 6th graders, this year. I asked some folks to evaluate me earlier in the year and a suggestion was made to meet with the kids during the Sunday School hour occasionally because there are so many more kids there than come to activities. It has been a huge success. I have met with the classes for games, lessons and snacks once in Sept. and once in Oct. And when I took them ice blocking, we had almost 30 people attend. I won't be leading the class every

month, but do plan to lead occasionally to continue to get the kids to know each other and want to hang out so that we can keep them coming as they get to the age for the middle and the high school group.

<u>Family Camp</u>: I was in charge of family camp again this year, along with Kristin Langguth and Lisa Ramstad. Our numbers were down a bit, but the weather was pretty bad that weekend. We had about 50 attend over the course of the weekend—with day campers and those that stayed for the weekend. Next summer we are hoping to go in late June. Watch for dates.

My summer: With my added time this summer covering for PJ's sabbatical, one of my goals was to figure out a way to minister to married couples. I found a course by Alpha and have offered it this fall. We limited the class to 10 couples because it is quite an undertaking. The format is you set up a candle light dinner at separate tables for each couple, and serve them dinner. They watch a video, which is paused to offer time for them to do work in a work book. It has been a great class and we hope to offer it again after Christmas. We charged \$40 per couple and I also got a Thrivent grant of \$250 for the class.

<u>Visitation:</u> PB and I continue to share visitation. I regularly bring communion to shut-ins and make hospital visits.

<u>Family Fun Nights</u>: This fall, Jacque Story and I have been planning Family Fun nights. We had 70 attend our Super Hero Family night in September. Trunk or Treat is planned for October and Advent log making in November. These seem to be an important blessing in the lives of many of our families.

<u>Blog</u>: I continue to enjoy writing and challenging myself to write about faith in everyday life. You can follow our blog on the website.

Education

Silverdale Lutheran Preschool

The Preschool is starting its twenty first year of being a ministry of Silverdale Lutheran Church. We offer an A.M and P.M. Pre-Kindergarten class, one M/W/F three and a half, four year old class, one T/Th three year old class and one M/W two year old class. To provide a quality program each class is limited to ten children. The two year old class has a teacher and a teacher's aide. As of November 1st, we have an enrollment of 48 students in our program with children on waiting lists. Our program has many Navy families who hear about us through word of mouth (which is the best advertisement) and are looking for a new home church. Through the ministry of the preschool we can help connect military and non-military families with the church.

The Preschool has a staff of five, which works very hard together as a supportive team. Teaching the M/W/F class is Teresa Corogliano and this is her ninth year. Tricia Enger is teaching the M/W and T/Th classes and this is her thirteenth year with us. Debbie Kramer is the Teachers Aid in the M/W and this is her third year. Our Preschool Office assistant is Carol DeRusha and this will be her fourteenth year with us. This will make twenty and a half years that I (Nancy Williams) have been at the Preschool. I teach the M/W/F A.M and P.M Pre-Kindergarten classes and this will be my fourteenth year as the Director. Our staff provides a safe, hands on and loving environment through the Grace of Jesus Christ,

The 2014-2015 Preschool Advisory Board members are: Mary Lou Trent, Karen Rowley, Cathy Hunt, Barb Hahn, Jane Rhodes, Lisa Ottenbacher and Andrea Tellinghuisen which is our parent of the Preschool. Our Board meetings are on the seconded Tuesday of each month at 7:00 p.m. in room 4. The Board meetings are open to the church congregation and preschool parents.

The Preschool has been enrolled in the Thrivent Choice Program now for five years. We so appreciate any donations that are given. All donations made through The Thrivent Choice program go into our Tuition Aid Fund. The Preschool received \$266.00 for the year. This fund allows us to offer help to families that may need help with tuition or emergency situations.

The Preschool has been a member of the Evangelical Lutheran Education Association, (ELEA) since 1995. The purpose of the association is to promote and support quality education programs. These are Christ-centered programs in early childhood centers, elementary and high schools. Each year the ELEA has a conference that the Preschool staff is very blessed to attend. This gives the staff the opportunity to network with other educators, see new products and continue our own education.

This year the Preschool made a donation of materials in the amount of \$175.00 to improve the playground. Sanding and staining the playground equipment, benches, a new tarp for the climbing structure and a new sandbox lid. All the work was donated by Church members. We also set aside \$1,000.00 to our Tuition Aid Fund. We had fund-raisers to help support our community. An ongoing food drive and a clothing and toy drive for The Foodline. In the 2014-2015 school year we helped families by giving \$2,480.00 of tuition aid.

Communication and visibility of the Preschool within the congregation is a very important part of our ministry. We enjoy having you visit our classrooms, reading to the children in the classroom, taking a look at the bulletin boards in the halls and joining us for Preschool Sunday. Your welcome any time to stop by.

We are blessed to provide a nurturing Christian Environment for God's special gifts, the children. We hope to make the experience of Preschool a positive one for the whole family.

Fat Tuesday was a huge success thanks to Darcy Lund. The atmosphere was merry and the pancakes were delicious. Thanks to all of the volunteers who decorated the hall, cooked the pancakes and bacon, provided set up, take down and cleanup.

The Lenten Services were again good in attendence, not only to the services but to the soup dinners again. Each week there was an average of 70-75 people present to enjoy time together, good food, and most importantly, worship. Property and Grounds

To all members and guests of Silverdale Lutheran Church, please know that my number one goal is to ensure a clean, safe and well-maintained church property. To the SLC Maintenance Manager, Janitorial Staff, and all of the volunteers contributing their time and talent towards this goal, I extend my personal thanks. You all are truly a blessing.

As your Property and Grounds Council Member I am the primary point of contact for property and grounds owned and managed by SLC. I work with other SLC Council Members, the Maintenance Manager, janitorial staff, and congregants to identify and address cleanliness, maintenance and repair issues needing attention. I also work with the Board of Trustees to provide improvement recommendations and to ensure we operate within prescribed financial constraints.

A facility the size of SLC takes a significant amount of resources to maintain. Both time and money factor into all facility maintenance issues and repair decisions so the willingness of volunteers to augment the duties of our Maintenance Manager and janitorial staff is essential for us to operate within budget. Your contribution of time and talent towards the maintenance of our property and grounds is greatly appreciated.

There were many projects completed this past year and some that were planned but not accomplished. One thing I learned is that our maintenance tasks run from the simple to the complex; from routine to emergent. Some of the more routine tasks have a prescribed pace but none the less take resources to accomplish. Things like keeping the property trimmed and green takes a substantial amount of effort every week. The same can be said for the various ministries and other events conducted in our facilities. Typically all of these ministries and events require the setup and teardown of tables and chairs, floors and bathrooms cleaned, and trash gathered and disposed. Again, we are blessed with volunteers who dedicate their time to help accomplish these "routine tasks." It could not be done without you!

For all maintenance and repair issues our ability to utilize volunteers is always looked at first. Avoiding service provision costs through the use of volunteers or material/money gifts, is a great way to stay at or below our operating budget. For example, repairing an exit door with volunteer labor and donated material avoided a cost of over \$500. Another example is the repair and modification of some of our rain gutters and down spouts. This effort not only avoided \$300 in costs, it also prevented water damage to the church. There were many other volunteer efforts like these that contributed to our ability to work within budget. This coming year I will work towards better planning when it comes to soliciting your help with our facility. Through more advanced scheduling I am hopeful that we continue to be blessed with many more volunteers.

I give special thanks to all of you for the recent opportunity to create our Grace-Filled, Spirit-Led mural in the Gathering Place. I was truly touched by your willingness to get your "hands dirty" and to interact with me to complete this project. As an artist I want you to know how inspirational this is to me. Being truly blessed is the feeling I get when I look at the mural. I pray that we continue to be blessed with this kind of interaction and your willingness to dirty your hands as it truly results in amazing things.

The SLC Family Camp weekend went well but the "Geezer Camp" was canceled due to insufficient interest. The SLC Picnic had lower attendance this year perhaps because no one stepped forward as a leader for activities but it was still very enjoyable. The food, fellowship, games, bible study, and relaxation were all great at Family Camp.

The week long All Church Camp for youth from 3rd through 8th grade was a success again this year thanks to Dawn-Marie Duarte as the Camp Director and Bee Rose as Kitchen Chef along with SLC and Emmanuel Lutheran adults as Kitchen helpers. Susan Eagan was the Camp Nurse along with Ward Erickson who is one of the new Caretakers. Where else can you find a full week of Bible Camp for this age group for only \$160? The price is low because all counselors and the Nurse are volunteers with the Camp Director, Head Cook, and Lifeguards being the paid staff.

If you didn't use Olympic Lutherhaven this past summer, you will have to put it on your schedule for next summer because it is the best place in Kitsap County to swim, picnic, relax, and rejuvenate with fellow Christians.

Silverdale Lutheran Church is one of seven owning members of Olympic Lutherhaven and has been since 1955 when Emil Sunderland and many others of Silverdale Lutheran Church helped turn Rosey's Roost Resort into Emil Sunderland's vision of a Bible Camp on Wildcat Lake. With your help and the help of many other volunteers, we are continuing to maintain the Bible camp and picnic area for summer use. This year our accomplishments have been mostly to do maintenance on the buildings and property. Those projects have included removal of the deteriorated play set at the Camp, installing a lockable enclosure around the Camp firewood supply, replacement of the Camp Dock decking, replacement of the Caretaker house carpets, minor electrical repair in the Caretaker house, repair of the Camp kitchen range, repair of the riding lawn mower, and installing sheetrock in the Caretaker house stairwell. A significant new customer this year was the Kitsap County 4-H club that used our Camp due to problems with their facility. Scouts from local Troops have done their Eagle projects at Lutherhaven over the years and SLC Troop 1541 has used the facility for Eagle Court, summer meetings, and camping.

Maintenance projects for 2016 include the following: 1) Repair the "Big Toy" at the Camp; 2) Install a filter in the Picnic Area Well; 3) Improve downstairs Caretaker house bathroom; 4) Stain/paint Camp Cabins; 5) Convert Lodge exterior doors to push bar emergency exit doors. These projects are dependent on funding and volunteer labor.

Did you notice that we used the term volunteer a number of times? We need volunteers not just at SLC, but also at Olympic Lutherhaven! We need you to donate your time and talents to help provide a beautiful and fun place for youth of all ages to enjoy the outdoors and hear God's word. Olympic Lutherhaven belongs to our Father Almighty and all of us have a responsibility for good stewardship. Jesus asked that we teach the children and that is our task. There isn't much more rewarding than seeing children enjoying themselves while learning at Bible Camp or Family Camp. Come share the rewards!

Social Concerns

I would like to thank each of you who gave your time, your special talents and resources towards making 2015 a very successful year for our Social Concerns Committees and all its efforts. We continue to have many successful efforts each working to make the community we all live in a better place.

I would like to report on several efforts in 2015:

- 1) The Council voted to increase the percentage from the benevolence fund that we give to Hearty Meals this year. With increased food costs and increase demand the Council felt that this was truly a SLC ministry that benefited the homeless and disadvantaged in our community. This increase has allowed Hearty Meals to continue to do its excellent outreach efforts and to maintain a solid financial footing. Please see Audrey's report for the outstanding work that it does.
- 2) The Community Bulletin Board continues to be used as a source of information for resources and events happening in our community. The Community Bulletin Board is located in the Fellowship Hall. The bulletin board has information, flyers and brochures on Community resources, local events and other pertinent items that we hope is useful to our members. This continues to be an interactive board with a number of our members contributing to it. If you would like to have something placed on the board, please either put it in my Council box or get it to the Church Secretary. If you have an idea how to improve the board or how it may be better utilized, please feel free to call me or the new Social Concerns Council member. Be sure to check it out next time you are at Church.
- 3) The Council recently agreed to allow on the third Sunday of the month an informational table or booth be set up in the Fellowship Hall during services. This table will be used to highlight a social concern and outreach effort or other issues that the congregation might be interested in hearing about. It will also be used to raise our awareness around the issue. Anyone from the congregation would be able to come to the table to get more information, talk about issues impacting the concern, or even how one can become active in the group. We plan in the near future to have a table for the mental health concerns in our County. I have heard from our Church nurse and Kitsap Mental Health regarding their issues. Other possible tables may revolve around Habitat for Humanity and Veteran's Assistance issues. I will work with the incoming Social Concerns Council member to get this off and running.

I was unfortunately unable to get the world wide effort called "Free Little Library" off the ground. I hope to work with the new Social Concerns Councilmember in 2016 to get this going. The idea behind it is to have an small outside receptacle that we could place books in and anyone in the neighborhood could borrow them. The idea is to spread reading and ministry to the Community. Ideally the people would return the books and hopefully other books to keep it going. I will be looking into it more in the beginning months of the year. Please send me your thoughts or ideas about this.

It's hard to believe but this is my fourth and final year on the Council. It has been a privilege to serve the Council and I continue to be impressed with the wonderful people we have in our Church. We have been able to accomplish much and continue to have a very positive impact in our outreach and community efforts. I would like to thank the Council members, the Pastors and staff for all their support and guidance during this time.

Care Ministry

Care Ministry completed its 16th year of Christ-centered care at SLC. Care Ministry involves 3 main functions:

1) **Care Sharing** with individuals in their homes or long-term care facilities to include but not limited to friendly visits, light household tasks, running errands, providing transportation to appointments/church, shopping, and meal preparation 2) **Eucharistic Ministry** with lay ministers offering communion to shut-ins in

their homes or assisted living facilities and 3) **Grief Ministry** through the distribution of 66 books of *Journeying through Grief* to members who have lost a loved one.

There are currently 14 care ministers serving 20 care receivers. For many of our care receivers, their care ministers provided vital functions that greatly aided their health and safety. For others, they provided comfort and support in the last days of life. Thank you to the members of the Care Ministry team: I continue to be awed by your generosity of time and caring. **Care Ministers volunteered over 700 hours in 2015.** Care Ministry meetings are held every one to two months. Attendance at meetings is not required to be a Care Minister...only an open heart and a willingness to help others. Health Ministry

2015 completed the **6th year** of Health Ministry/Faith Community Nursing (FCN) at Silverdale Lutheran Church. Health Ministry/FCN activities in 2015 included:

- 1. Health related **articles** for the Beacon.
- 2. Maintenance of the **Automated External Defibrillator (AED)** program.
- 3. Countless **visits** to members in their home, the hospital, and long term care and rehab facilities as well as individual health counseling/education sessions, totaling more than 400 volunteer hours.
- 4. Coordination of **THE WALK AROUND THE WORLD** program, involving more than 20 participants and logging over 20,000 miles collectively through October.
- 5. Coordination of **TOUCHSTONE BEAR MINISTRY**. A *Touchstone Bear* is a teddy bear, approximately 15-inches tall, created from a garment worn by the loved one, perhaps a favorite garment. The needed fabric could be from a shirt, pajamas, several hankies, or any other lightweight garment. To allow for pattern fitting, each bear would require at least two special garments (all unused pieces would be returned). Often, the garment retains the scent of the loved one, which adds to the touchstone experience. Hugging a Touchstone Bear, and smelling the loved one through the bear, might bring a much needed connection, especially at a time when loss is so surreal. If you or someone you know would benefit from a Touchstone Bear, please contact the parish nurse. Touchstone Bears are made by a generous anonymous donor with the Parish Nurse facilitating the contacts. Ten bears were lovingly crafted in 2014.

As the *volunteer* FCN for SLC, I am at SLC most Sunday mornings and Tuesdays but please call to make an appointment. Hearty Meals

This year Hearty Meals program has noticed an increase in the number of people who join us each Wednesday for our weekly meal. I believe one reason is because of our new electronic reader sign which makes our

program known to more people and another because of the economy. We often serve between 60 and 65 and it has been increasing to 70 some weeks. For fiscal year 2015 we served 3180.

We have been serving a free meal to members of the community for over 20 years. Some are regular diners and others come in because they just heard of our service. Many of our diners are on a low or fixed income, some live alone, and a few may be homeless. Others are here for the fellowship. In the summer we have some families with small children.

We have two teams and 4 lead cooks. Each team has between 7 and 10 volunteers each week who work 4 to 6 hours each Wednesday. Many of our volunteers have been with us between 15 and 20 years.

This past year the church has been our biggest benefactor. From FEMA this year we received \$500.00 this summer. In August we were awarded an additional \$407.00 due to a reallocation of Phase 32 funding. This was totally unexpected and helped to restock our shelves and freezer with meat. Our summer brunch was well received and the generous contributions got us through some lean months.

For those of you who are not familiar with Silverdale Lutheran's community outreach program, please join us on Wednesday between noon and 1 p.m.

Music

We also appreciate the instrumentalists who sometimes accompany our liturgy and choirs such as soloists on guitar, cello, flute, drums, etc. We are especially blessed to have pastors who love to sing and play along on guitar and drums at the "drop of a hat"!

On occasion we have offered special concerts here at Silverdale Lutheran. We recently hosted the Stavanger Cathedral Choirs from Norway. Each December the Hometown Band (which rehearses weekly in our facility) performs for us. This coming spring we will be hosting Bells of the Sound in concert. It is my belief that though we are firmly in the electronic age, people still like to get a card in the mail, handwritten note that says "I care about you."

I have learned something this year: That Stewardship is MANY THINGS: It is Property & Grounds, Evangelism, Education, Fellowship, Social Concerns, Communication, Worship & Music, & Youth-all tied together in one messy gift. Please let me know how I can best help us to DO STEWARDSHIP! Let us together be good Stewards of God's Earth (We only live here!), God's Treasure (Not ours to keep, but to share!), and the Talents with which God gifted us (You have talent, I know you do!). Let's see Christ in every unwashed, weary face-each and every one of us.

MARTHA&MARY



Highlights of the past year include:

- The Martha & Mary KIDS / Children's Learning Center in Poulsbo achieved a "Quality of Excellence" rating in Early Achievers, Washington's quality rating and improvement system.
 Additionally, they earned recognition in the area of Interactions and Environment.
- A new Behavioral Health program was launched, addressing a critical need in our community by helping to eliminate "boarding" individuals with behavioral health needs inside hospitals and emergency rooms for weeks or even months on end due to a lack of viable care alternatives in Kitsap County.
- Flo Kempton, an active and long-time Martha & Mary volunteer was named a Kitsap Sun 2015 Health Care Hero, receiving a "Quality of Life Lifetime Achievement" award.
