Celebrates 25 years!

Dear Silverdale Lutheran Members, friends, family and visitors:

Every year at this time and on my drive to Silverdale, I am reminded of the word "chance." This is the week the deaf and/or blind who attend the Seabeck Conference Center Camp are given a "chance" to fellowship, enjoy the outdoors, participate in games, and enjoy the world's longest slip and slide chute (of which admittedly, I am a little envious).

There are ropes that guide them from activity to activity to remove any chance of getting lost or misguided. Guides are stationed to help many of them find a cup of coffee across the street. On one hand the recipients are given a chance, to be successful and on the other hand, all chance is taken away for safety sake. Interesting how we all want a "chance" by leaving nothing to "chance!"

From the very first day of taking this position as President of Silverdale Lutheran, I have heard a chorus of voices, "We have to attract more families." Another and more often heard version of that phrase is "We have to get younger!" Coincidently, a recent edition of the Seattle Times noted that Kitsap County is one of five counties in Washington that is getting younger!

I also learned that our K-5 Sunday School attendance has been following a national trend and **has decreased over the years.** That prompted the Church Council and ministry staff, to take action and find some solution(s) to address this situation. After a number of studies performed, committee meetings held, and discussions we discovered what parents wanted:

- Sunday School to be on Sunday, not another day of the week
- Less time between services and start of Sunday School
- Later start to the first service to get the kids ready

With the ministry staff in total agreement, The Council voted **unanimously** to change our worship times to 8:30am and 11:00am. To accomplish this task, some lag time between services has been removed and the service shortened to 60 minutes (give or take 4 or 5 minutes now and then for special occasions).

As we move forward with our new schedule, we are giving our Sunday School and youth a better **chance** to engage in our quality faith developing ministry. We did our best to place all the guide ropes and people in the right place to guide this safely.

Reflections of Summer

There is a well established addiction in our nation to brag about our "busy-ness." So I risk joining the crowd if I say, "It's been a busy summer." So let me say it this way…"It's been a meaningful summer."

My church summer has started off the last few years with middle camp, but personally it started a bit sooner as our family moved to a new neighborhood all of a mile away from our first Silverdale home. The new place has offered us more space, especially for Jadon and friends to keep connections going. His illness has not improved much over the summer, so we continue to pray and wait and try to get his health right. But his amazing patience and ability to go with the flow is a great teaching to me. Zoe continues to do all she can to be in front of a microphone or on a stage, and her highlight of the summer was getting to play Little Elsa in the CSTOCK summer production of Frozen.

Karen's summer deserves its own paragraph as she partnered with our church to do a summer feeding program at Cottage Bay apartments. Because of her teaching at Esquire Hills Elementary in East Bremerton, she has gotten to know the area, and thought this summer program would be a great connection to our community. Was it ever! If you haven't noticed before, look at how often great things happen in Jesus' ministry around food and a table. I was reminded of that when, about half way through the summer, Karen was called into the Cottage Bay office by the staff. They were excited to share how much the feeding program had helped change some things that were happening at Cottage Bay. Many of the skirmishes between kids had stopped; they were playing outside more often; racial tensions between some kids and families had all but disappeared. And that was in addition to the food given and connections made. **Thanks to all who volunteered and supported this effort!**

My summer did include another middle camp, and we piggybacked off the Grit theme being used for Vacation Bible School. This helped me take a run at it before July, and was great for our middle school youth to focus on as a theme. More and more their faith and beliefs are challenged. What does it take to follow Jesus? We plan for this question to be in

the forefront throughout their faith formation here. As soon as middle camp at Lutherhaven was done, my focus shifted to our Montana Service Trip with the Blackfeet Nation. This year our trip was on our own (we had gone with YouthWorks in the past), and that turned out to be a great decision. We were able to spend much more time with the tribal elders, be on our own schedule, and, in a nutshell, fully engage in "native time." This time we also stayed for almost the entire Sundance ceremony. This offered an intense experience and deep cultural immersion. It also offered our youth the opportunity to connect deeply to their faith. They were led to a deep appreciation of creation, a deep connection within the group AND to the Blackfeet, and a deep appreciation of how much God loves them and has done for them in Jesus Christ. Along with those meals I mentioned above, a lot happens around Jesus when people serve and connect with others. After arriving home from Montana at 11pm Sunday night, I found myself at the church again around 6:45am to get ready for a week of VBS. Around 70 youth joined a very well prepped and excited staff for a wonderful week of G.R.I.T. - God-given, Really Important Tools. My favorite part was re-writing the lyrics to the popular song Old Town Road and singing it with the kids. They are amazing learners! Once again, our VBS was unique as we write our own curriculum, and it clearly pointed to God's saving work in Jesus Christ.

With the fall season ahead. I still have dump trailers to rent and land to fill with dirt and gravel and garden soil. We still have decisions to make about our son's health and school. Karen has ANOTHER room move at school. And there are all kinds of preparations to make to help our families nurture their youth in the faith – campouts, retreats, Sunday and Wednesday classes and meals, etc. And there are all kinds of ways to keep busy. My hope and prayer is that whatever we busy ourselves with, it is meaningful, fruitful, and faithful.

There are ways for you to engage – mentoring, offering a meal, helping to organize.
