Taking Our Temperature

Once again, it's time to take our temperature—to have our yearly "physical." We celebrated a beautiful 75th anniversary, honoring the remarkable legacy of SLC—past, present, and future. My sabbatical is bearing good fruit as we continue to explore how we can understand and reach out to the growing "de-churched" population. It is inspiring to see the level of interest and concern for these individuals whom we know and love. Having over 100 people attend my Sunday class on "de-churching" gives me real hope for our future.





Since COVID, our traditional measure of engagement—average in-person worship attendance—has been challenging to assess. Our current average attendance is just over 300 per Sunday, which is about 20% (50 people) lower than pre-COVID numbers. From what I understand, this rate of decline is typical among churches of all kinds who provide a livestream, but it remains an area of concern. I continue to pray that everyone who does not have a medical or physical limitation will return to in-person worship.

Another traditional measure of our "temperature" is, of course, our finances. Financially, we are a little behind this year, but our overall giving has increased and kept pace with inflation. Moreover, this month we will have our mortgage paid off! Paying off the mortgage is truly a milestone worth celebrating. Though we are about \$16K at the end of October, our finances remain solid but certainly there is room for improvement with regard to our financial stewardship.





There are many other ways to take our temperature. The vitality of our worship and music ministry is inspiring. Children and youth ministry, small groups, service groups, outreach efforts, and members' acts of love and care are all strong indicators of our health. *Just browse this Annual Report to see the vitality of SLC!* All in all, we are well-positioned to focus on our mission of "Connecting More to Christ and Loving Kitsap and the World" as we move beyond our 75th anniversary.

Changes in Staff and Focus

We were saddened this year to lose two outstanding staff members, Bruce Kramer and Lisa Gregg, but we are pleased to welcome **Kathleen Johnson** and **Ann Daly** into their roles.

This year, we are also making adjustments in our staff structure to support the growth of our ministry.

We are thrilled to elevate **Jessica Voit** into greater leadership as "Director of Children and Youth Ministry." Jessica will oversee planning and support for this ministry area, with PJ as the primary supporting pastor. Jessica's gifts are incredible, and we are excited to see what she accomplishes in the coming years.

PJ will continue working with our youth but will move to a more general **Associate Pastor** role. We need additional support for pastoral care, so PJ will dedicate more time to visiting homebound and hospitalized members, reaching out to inactive members, and working with young adults.

Wider-Church ELCA Issues

In my report last year, I mentioned the ELCA's 2022 Churchwide Assembly decision to form a "Commission for a Renewed Lutheran Church," that was tasked with a major revision of the ELCA's Constitution (including the Model Constitution for Congregations, the content of which is largely required of every congregation). One of the goals for this revision is dismantling "systemic racism." The latest update I received from our Synod's representative on the Commission suggests they are struggling with the size of this task.



As of now, I have no details on what might be presented at the ELCA's 2025 Churchwide Assembly, but we will keep you informed as soon as more information becomes available. To review last' years report visit: https://bit.ly/SLC2023Report

Constitutional issues aside, during my sabbatical, I also did a lot of praying and thinking about how I lead SLC with respect to the ongoing disconnect many have with the theological and social positions of the ELCA. Many of us are comfortable with the ELCA's newer social statements and positions, while others are not, and perhaps some are indifferent. My main concern, however, is theological. I believe devout Christians can hold different views on social issues while still being united in faith. Our foundation is a shared Confession of Faith, not uniformity on social issues.



My personal struggle with the ELCA's direction centers on the question: What is the Gospel? In my view, the ELCA's primary focus is on social issues — rather than the Gospel itself. While the core Lutheran confession of faith, the Augsburg Confession, Article IV, articulates the Gospel beautifully, it does not seem to be the primary driver of our wider church. Here is Article IV, to clarify what I mean by "Gospel":

Furthermore, it is taught that we cannot obtain forgiveness of sin and righteousness before God through our merit, work, or satisfactions, but that we receive forgiveness of sin and become righteous before God out of grace for Christ's sake through faith when we believe that Christ has suffered for us and that for his sake our sin is forgiven and righteousness and eternal life are given to us. For God will regard and reckon this faith as righteousness in his sight, as St. Paul says in Romans 3:21–26 and 4:5.

Though I could list examples where I feel the Gospel has been overshadowed or even replaced by law and social issues, I'll stop here for now. I'm always open to conversations about this matter and have shared my concerns in the past with your Council. When I was ordained, as well as at my installation at SLC, I promised to "preach and teach in accordance with the Holy Scriptures and the Confessions of the Lutheran Church." I share my concerns here out of a commitment to honor my ordination and installation vows.

A Return from Germany with Renewed Purpose



This year, I am finishing up this report on the plane returning from our Luther Reformation Tour in Germany. It was humbling to witness the great sacrifices many made to reclaim the Word and spark the Gospel-centered movement of which SLC is a descendant. I return determined to continue preaching and teaching the Gospel, offering the gift of forgiveness and eternal life through Christ Jesus.

I hope we will never take this incredible gift for granted that frees us from accusation of the the law and empowers us to love and serve our neighbors. I pray that each of our 900 members will realize their role as stewards of this Gospel and will help ensure it is passed down to future generations.

We have had another great year of ministry, and I am excited to continue my call here at SLC. I am deeply grateful to serve in this community, and my thanks go to our wonderful staff, my partner Pastor Jonathan, and my wife Sandy for her constant support. Sandy and I also want to thank SLC for all the support shown to us in the recent passing of her mother. God bless you all.

Associate Pastor Jonathan Sansgaard

It has been a great year of ministry with all of you, and I continue to daily be thankful for our work in this place, especially standing on the foundation of 75 years of sharing the good news in Kitsap and beyond. This year will bring some change in my call here at SLC, as my title changes to Associate Pastor. I will continue to be working with our youth and families, but will also put more time into visitation at homes, hospitals, and care facilities, working with young adults, and helping to connect with those who have experienced some disconnection with the church.

As Jessica Voigt transitions into a Director position for Children, Youth, and Family Ministry, she will be able to take on more of the planning, detail, and direction of many of our programs. This will be an exciting shift in our ministry that will involve Pastor Bill, myself, and Jessica, and I think it will utilize our gifts, account for staff changes, and make our team more efficient and connected with our congregation and community. You'll hear more about this at our annual meeting, but let's get to my report for the past year...



CHILDREN

Preschool - Continuing to lead chapel every third week on rotation with Pastor Bill and Jessica.

Sunday School - Sounding board for Jessica on our program and continuing to lead our High School Sunday School.

VBS - Offered support, wrote and led our theme song, and led each day's opening and closing.

First Communion - We welcomed several new young people to the table on Maundy Thursday after meeting throughout Lent.

MIDDLE SCHOOL

middle wednesdays

This group had a great year of connection, and we are shaking things up a bit as of this fall. The middle will continue meeting on Wednesday nights, but with a new time, 6:30-8:00pm, and without the high school, as they move to a new night. So far, this fall has brought in 3-4 friends and a few new 6th graders from our congregation as it continues to grow.

Jacque Story led the group with some help last year, and Jessica Voigt will be taking the reins as of this fall. This continues to be a very committed group.

MIDDLE CAMP

We set another record this year with 43 youth at middle camp, and the theme "Flashing Lights" was VERY popular. Our music minister, Justin Cormier, worked up an entire band - partly electric - for each campfire and our Glow Dance was one of the most popular events ever. This continues to be an amazing opportunity for young people in our church and community, and for high school and college youth to lead as counselors as well. I really think this is one of the best things we do to fulfill our mission.



ALL CHURCH CAMP

I have continued to work as the Chaplain, or Resident Pastor, for this camp, sponsored by Olympic Lutherhaven. While it was one of their smaller groups in the past 10 years, they continue to offer a great camp experience, and I enjoyed connecting scripture to their Lorax theme.

HIGH SCHOOL

SLY Sundays - We had a great year with a consistent group last year, and we have taken off walking through the Bible as we start our fall program. I am taking some more time to write our own curriculum, and I think it is working really well so far.

Youth Nights - Last year our high schoolers met on Wednesdays, but this fall Jessica and I decided to make this group mobile. We will be meeting off campus the second Sunday of each month for service events, dinners, scavenger hunts and much more. High schoolers who are ready can also help lead small groups, games, or be helpers with the middle on Wednesday nights. This will give them their own time, allow for busy schedules, and open an opportunity for leadership.



CONFIRMATION



Our new 18 month program is up and running, and we have another great group of confirmands entering the end of their first year of class. We met around the Creed last winter, went for a spring hike, and are starting in on the 10 Commandments this fall. We will also be connecting with mentors and focusing on communion visits and service projects as we go forward. We have decided to have our next class overlap with our current one so that each year we will have a rotating schedule and a new Confirmation group every Reformation Sunday starting in 2025.

HIKES AND BACKPACKING





In the second year of our VERY popular high school backpacking trip, the group decided to go to one of the most unique parts of Olympic National Park - the Pacific Coast. We did the Ozette Triangle hike over three days and two nights, enjoying the scenery, great company, and a sort of first century meal-into-communion worship on the way home. We even made and dehydrated our own meals. We also had three hikes throughout the summer that drew a range of folks, which included one that had a last hike for an older member and first hike for a younger one.

YOUNG ADULTS

This is one of our most mobile groups in the congregation, with lots of movement in and out of the congregation. It is also a group that loves to lead. From Council to music to tech to youth leadership, our young adults are involved. We did not gather much officially in 2024 during and after my sabbatical, but we have a kickoff trivia event in October that will help us set our sights on a new year together.



INTERN

I am currently supervising our Word and Service Ministry intern, Kim Holmes-Grasmick, and it has been a joy to work with her as she seeks to become a Rostered Deacon in the ELCA. We will also be working more closely together as I take a larger role in visitation, part of her staff position here at SLC.


In addition to the retirement communities, I join the pastors in visiting the hospitalized and homebound regularly.

It all stretched my skills and confidence and I am grateful for the opportunity and growth as well as working more closely with Pastor Jonathan and Justin.



Women's Ministry:



Ladies' Night Out is the 2nd Tuesday of each month for women 18 and older. I have tried a variety of events over the last 3 years to encourage more attendance and a more intergenerational group, but the event that gets the most attendance is meeting at a restaurant for a meal and conversation. Beginning in October, we will change the focus of LNO to be just that, and we will meet at a restaurant — usually The Olive Garden. It is always the second Tuesday of the month at 5:30 pm.

Fall Retreat – Turn! Turn! Finding the Gospel in Ecclesiastes:

In November of 2023 (reporting here because it hadn't happened by the time of the last annual report) we had a 1 day retreat at SLC in the Gathering Place attended by more than 30 women. It was a wonderful time of fellowship and sharing. Ecclesiastes is a hard book, but we did find the gospel in it!





Spring Retreat at St. Andrew's House:

Pastor Amanda Olson de Castillo led a packed house where we looked at lament and praise in the Psalms. This retreat is always a personally restorative time for the attendees, and also a time to deepen fellowship and connection. We plan to be at St. Andrew's House again President's Day Weekend, 2025.

Luther Seminary and Candidacy:

I am still studying toward my MA in Systematic Theology, which is taking longer than I expected because of the ups and downs with my health over the last 2 years, and I am still in candidacy with the ELCA for the diaconate. Part of the requirement for ordination is 1000 hours of internship with a congregation. Because the focus of my work here at SLC closely mirrors what I'd like to do professionally, the synod has given me permission to do 600 hours of my internship here, and I was installed May 26th as Diaconal Intern. The other 400 hours will be at Spirit of Life Lutheran Church under the mentorship of Pastor Marietta Nelson-Bittle, and I was installed on October 20th. Both internships will be largely carrying on my Pastoral Care Assistant job description, with some special projects added in. Lisa Gregg, Cathy Bohman and David Soine cleared out and painted an office for me, right by the Fellowship Hall which has been a huge blessing to me and has also been very helpful for impromptu pastoral care visits. Diaconal Intern Installations at SLC and SOLLC

Silverdale Lutheran Church faithfully embraces its mission of "Connecting to Christ and Loving Kitsap". Through the generosity of folks sharing their time, talents and resources, we do God's amazing work!! SLC's diverse ministry efforts are shared throughout the 2024 annual report as well as on our website under Community Outreach. I hope you take a moment to learn a bit more about these servant opportunities and pray for our work together.

God's Work. Our Hands.

"God's work. Our hands." servant events happen twice each year in May and December. On those days the Gathering Place is filled with stations to use your helping hands to work on gifts/projects to support many of our Kitsap ministries and beyond.

At SLC we believe in nurturing the servant hearts of our children and youth. Throughout the year we intentionally place a variety of servant projects into the Sunday School time and Wednesday Youth Nights. During Vacation Bible School, the SERVE station created care packages for sailors on one of our submarines, made CKSD staff appreciation gifts, filled festive snack bags for the Hearty Meal guests and created birthday celebration bags for the Central Kitsap Food Bank. The VBS offering supported the Hearty Meals lunch on two Wednesdays.



SLC affirms the staff of CKSD Emerald Heights, Silver Ridge, Esquire Hills and Hawk Elementary Schools along with our SLC Preschool. Every six weeks during the school year, we seek to remind 253 staff that we appreciate their work and compassionate hearts for our community's children and families. As we uplift the staff, it is important to remember that those efforts during 2024 touched over 668 low-income children and 365 military children

SLC is engaged with our local schools in a variety of ways

Under the leadership of Lisa Ottenbacher, our "Reading Buddies" program listens to second grade & kindergarten children at Silver Ridge Elementary every Thursday morning. An SLC team led by Marilyn & Tom Hawks and Raejean Avalos, lead after school STEM "Robotics" and "Rocket" clubs at Esquire Hills Elementary. SLC is supporting an afterschool "Battle of the Books" club at Hawk Elementary under the leadership of SLC member Kurt Thompson, Hawk's librarian. SLC provided 5 scholarships for the "Girls on the Run" enrichment program at Esquire Hills last spring and cheered on the 16 girls at their 5K run, plus 3 SLC girls from other schools. SLC members are called to both serve on the staff of as well as volunteer time at numerous local schools and districts.

In June, we established a "Little Free Library" on our campus located on the right side of the Gathering Place. Our library offers books for infants through Grade 5. Families are encouraged to stop by and take a book to keep in their home. The book does not have to be returned nor does one have to bring back a book to replace it. This library is one more way SLC is seeking to bless our community.



We impact the military community through offering a place of worship, learning, fellowship and service for them to call home during the years they are stationed among us.

Many military families attend SLC's preschool. Families are connected through Vacation Bible School, family events, camps and our scout programs. Commands use our facility for meetings and gatherings. Our commitment to local schools enriches military children's education. We give care packages to sailors who are local and those who are deployed. Through "Operation Christmas Miracle" we share grocery cards for a holiday meal and gifts for the children of lower enlisted families struggling to live in this economy.



SLC provides space for several support groups to meet on our campus: Al Anon, Alzheimer's and Parkinson's groups. Each year a SLC Team participates in the "Walk to End Alzheimer's – Kitsap Peninsula" and raises funds to support programs and research. We walk for those living with dementia in our congregation, those who are supporting people with the disease and those we have lost.



SLC partners with Kitsap Community Resources to provide Thanksgiving and Christmas baskets to folks within our community dealing with food insecurity. Lisa Gregg & Linda Day lead this ministry to fill 48 baskets, overflowing with the fixings for a healthy, festive holiday meal.

In 2024, Community Outreach projects were generously funded through many SLC members' Thrivent Action Team Community Grants, the SLC Social Concerns budget, summer brunches and SLC member gifts to SLC's Community Outreach Fund.



The Community Outreach Equity Fund was established in 2021 to assist in outreach projects which are financially beyond budgeted dollars or grants. You can donate directly to this fund at any time during the year. You may give a gift in honor/memory of someone, from an estate, or just because you have a heart for loving Kitsap.



I am grateful for the opportunity to serve with you to make a difference in our community and beyond! I look forward to the coming year as God will continue to surprise us with ways to strengthen our current ministries and with new places to join in partnership. 

We have faced some challenges in meeting our ministry expenses, as the end of our 2024 fiscal year fast approaches. This summer, Silverdale Lutheran Church received exciting news from the Washington State Emergency Management Division: our third grant application for the 2024 Nonprofit Security Grant Program (NSGP) was **approved** for the full amount of \$150,000—again!




Over the past three years, we have been awarded a total of **\$450,000** in grant funding to enhance the physical security of our church campus. Truly, a blessing!

Below are the facility hardening activities we submitted and received approval for:

- Fencing Complete the western and northern perimeter.
- Cameras Whole parking lot area.
- Parking Lot & Driveway Lighting Provides greater illumination in the dark areas using LED lighting technology.
- Bullet Resistant Windows Install in the preschool and staff offices.
- Back-Up Natural Gas Generator Provides instantaneous power in the case of a power blackout to run the critical security, lighting and camera surveillance systems on entire church campus.

You may have noticed that we've completed some of the physical security projects that were approved, using the 2023 grant funds.





As you can see, SLC has made significant strides in capital improvements during my tenure, ensuring lasting benefits for our congregation's future. These upgrades also address the need to proactively meet today's security requirements, as well.

Back in April, Trustees approved Cathy Bohman and Jessica Voigt proposal to refurbish the Study/Library.





The Meta Organworks, a custom designed software-based virtual organ, finally arrived. It was built and dedicated in September.

Property & Grounds

COVID-19 Impacts:

COVID-19 As the result of restrictions to help prevent the spread of COVID-19, the installed projectors and screens to better facilitate the on-line and live worship services have allowed members including home bound, guests, and on-line viewers to participate in worship.

The live streaming equipment along with the two projectors and screens hasn't yet proven to reduce the need for a large number of bulletins but worshipers can now keep their eyes and attention toward the Altar while singing. Perhaps more important has been that those concerned with catching or spreading COVID-19 or its variants and those unable to travel from home can now participate in Worship.



Maintenance Issues:

Lisa Gregg has performed just about any task that is required plus coordinates our efforts to help her with maintenance issues during our Annual Clean-up prior to Easter. She has contracted with vendors to have the carpets cleaned, the vinyl floors waxed, organized the maintenance of the parking area, helped to install a new intercom system, and just about any other task needed to keep our campus looking and operating good.

Unfortunately, Lisa Gregg's last day is today but she has spent the better part of this week and last transitioning Ann Daly into the position as Maintenance Manager.

There have been many maintenance or improvement projects this year including the following: The SLC Office has been remodeled, Kim Grasmick now has an office, A Smart TV was installed in the Narthex, The Library/Cry Room has been remodeled, New cameras have been installed in the Sanctuary, Security Cameras now in the Gathering Place, and trial runs have been tried on new parking lot sealants.



Security and Security Alarm Calls:



We continue to monitor the Northwest corner of the parking lot along with the main and security entrances to the Gathering Place plus the Fellowship Hall patio and the main building entrance with surveillance cameras. However, we now have a new system inside the buildings that is controllable with an App on our phones.

The new system includes the Fire Alarm system however there have been bugs because our phone lines are VOIP. Therefore, we have now changed 2 of the 4 lines to standard CenturyLink lines plus purchasing a special interface to allow our Fire Alarm system to work properly. As part of the security upgrade all door locks have also been replaced in both the Gathering Place and the main building. There have been some minor hiccups with the new security system that have been resolved shortly after they were noticed.



ADA Doors for Gathering Place Restrooms & Front Door:



We now have ADA openers on the main building restrooms and front door and in the Gathering Place also. Advance Door Systems installed ADA openers in the Gathering Place last year so they are now active. The next step is to install a handicap access ramp to the Gathering Place entrance from the parking lot while also replacing two regular parking spaces with ADA parking spaces.

Landscape Changes:

We are still considering trimming and/or removing trees around the perimeter of the church. The purpose is to reduce the need to clean out the gutters, reduce roof maintenance around the church buildings, and to enhance security by making the church more visible to both Ridgetop Boulevard and Ridgepoint Drive. Trees would also be removed or trimmed along the western border to improve our view while also keeping headlights out of the Breckinridge apartments by planting dense but limited height shrubs. The plan for 2025 is remove many of the Western border trees since their roots are starting to damage the parking lot blacktop. We have an estimate to accomplish this for only about \$4K. In addition there are plans to install a fence along the Western border using grant application money.

Other Maintenance Related Notes:

We are looking into replacing deteriorated Skylights, getting estimates for Parking Lot Pole Lamp replacements, minor repair of curb by GP damaged during snow removal, Mark Lund and Grant Rittenbach are volunteering on Wednesdays to help with routine maintenance, Room 4 wiring completed to Conference Tables, Repair of Sanctuary carpet damage caused by Book lice coming up from the concrete, and the hiring of ZeroRez as our Carpet Cleaner which may result in less scheduling of cleaning with better results.


Silverdale Lutheran Church (SLC) is one of seven owning members of Olympic Lutherhaven with the addition of Evergreen Lutheran Church in February 2023. SLC has been an owner since 1955 when Emil Sunderland and others from SLC and Our Saviours Lutheran Church helped turn Rosey's Roost Resort into Emil Sunderland's vision of a Youth Bible Camp on Wildcat Lake. With your help and the help of many other volunteers, we are continuing to maintain the Camp and Picnic areas from late Spring to early Fall use.



Our Caretakers, Jolene & John Thayer, were hired effective June 1, 2022 and continue to serve very well through this past year.

The Annual Work Party this year was hosted by Vinland Lutheran. SLC's Family Camp weekend was renamed this year and shared the week with Middle Camp led by Pastor Jonathan and Jessica Voight. Bethany Lutheran, Poulsbo First Lutheran, and Vinland also had their Family Camps but Emmanuel and Our Saviours did not hold a Camp but did have their Picnics. All Church Camp ran again this year but with slightly less attendance from last year. The Picnic Area was popular with many during the hot summer days.





After getting the Water System Improvement plan approved by the County and the State, there was significant effort to get the water system ready for the Camping season. Many volunteer hours were completed in retrenching power and expanding the Well portion of the Craft Shack building. The Craft Shack area devoted to either crafts or class room space had to be downsized in order to install a 1500 gallon reservoir tank plus all the new pumps and pressure tanks.

Maintenance projects to consider for 2025 include the following:

- Improve downstairs Caretaker house bathroom
- Stain/paint Camp Cabins
- Maintain the Camp driveway exit
- Replace the Picnic Volleyball court sand
- Replace Lodge Kitchen counter tops
- Fill in the many low spots in the lawns



The Camp Area Well is being sample tested monthly from May through November for contaminants to ensure the water remains safe and has passed all tests this year. The Picnic Area well is also tested regularly with passing results.



Thus the Board has put together some ideas on how to raise donations which this year have included Bingo at McCloud's Grill House, meals at Red Robin, and soon a fund raising Auction at Vinland Lutheran Church.




VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

Social Concerns Katie Shaw

It's that time again! I have enjoyed another year being part of your council and part of this wonderful community of believers, volunteers, servants, and stewards. I am constantly amazed by the way this congregation steps up to devote their time and share their passions.

This year was a somewhat slow year for me as social concerns chair, since a fair amount of my SLC time was spent working on the 75th Anniversary celebration events. I enjoyed spending time with a wonderful group of people on the planning committee to celebrate our church's history and our future.





We once again took to the Silverdale Waterfront as a group of us walked in the Alzheimer's Walk for the fourth year in a row. This event is not only a great time of fellowship, but also facilitates community support connections for folks who are suffering from or caretaking for someone with Alzheimer's. This year was especially poignant, as we mourned losses to Alzheimer's within our congregation. Our small but mighty group of walkers and supporters raised \$2,310 for the Alzheimer's Association across 23 separate donors and nine walkers.

In continuation of our support for refugees in our area, we used budgeted funds to purchase supplies to create 16 hygiene kits that were donated to and will be distributed by Lutheran Community Services Northwest to refugees in need in the Puget Sound area.

Besides these, I have been taking a closer look at our benevolences and developing some guidelines about how those should be determined. I believe it is important to consider these very carefully; just as we expect the congregation to give of their first fruits, the benevolences could be considered our own first fruits of what the congregation has given. We need to be good stewards of this, and to do so, I think it would be helpful to have written guidelines to guide myself and, at the end of 2025, my successor. Stay tuned for more on this; I welcome congregational input!



Hearty Meals



2024 has been as very exciting and rewarding year for Hearty Meals. Our church family have generously donated their time, food, money and creativity to continue this ministry for our community. We have provided over 3,500 meals this year alone. 2,558 of these were enjoyed in the Fellowship Hall. 978 To Go Meals were shared, with many of these being taken to shutins and homeless people.



We have continued with traditional celebrations which have included holiday meals the week before Easter,

Thanksgiving and Christmas.





We helped to celebrate 4 wedding anniversaries. All of the couples donated money to sponsor and share their love with our diners. Many others have sponsored Meals since Pat and Matt Ryan sponsored their anniversary.





As a part of SLC's 75th Anniversary, we will celebrate the 30 years that Hearty Meals has been feeding Kitsap by honoring our volunteers, past and present, with a High Tea in November.

We thank the Lord for the generosity of our Silverdale Lutheran family and the appreciation of the Kitsap community.



Often when disaster strikes or war drives families from their homes, our hearts ache with compassion. Making LWR mission quilts is a tangible way our SLC quilters express their love to our neighbors in need. Quilts are used as warm bedding, simple tents, room dividers or floor coverings. Each quilt reflects Gods loving presence in a world rife with suffering.

The personal care kits and school kits we send each year are specifically designed to help people cope with poverty, disasters, conflict and more. A kit can help someone maintain good hygiene or to be able to continue education during a crisis. LWR kits provide dignity and hope in the direst situations.

World wide in 2023 your love reached 551,700 neighbors in need in 14 countries. That included194,983 quilts.....123,920 personal care kits.....and 190,043 school kits the SLC contributed to!!! The world wide quilt numbers were down a little bit but the numbers for the kits were considerably higher! SLC numbers for 2024 are as follows:

Personal Care Kits = 66 School Kits = 132





The vision statement of the Boy Scouts of America is to prepare every eligible youth in America to become a responsible, participating citizen and leader who is guided by the Scout Oath and Law.



Every meeting we open with the Pledge of Allegiance, the Scout Oath and the Scout Law. We close our meetings with the Scout Outdoor Code. The Scout Oath is a promise to uphold all which Scouts hold sacred. The Scout Law has twelve points, which when combined remind a Scout with the qualities to be a good person. The Outdoor Code is a pledge to be good stewards of the outdoors. This tradition supports us maintaining the ideals of Scouting.

Membership

We currently have 18 scouts in our troop. This is up from 14 scouts at this time last year.

Adventures

Baden-Powell, the founder of the Scouting movement, once said: "A week of camp life is worth six months of theoretical teaching in the meeting room." We have been actively pursuing the goal of having at least one outdoor adventure every month. These are some of our main highlights:

Summer at Lutherhaven

Each summer we hold our Monday meetings outside at the picnic side of Olympic Lutherhaven. We spent the summer outside swimming, fishing, picnicking, serving and just overall being outside. This enables the Scouts with the main reason they keep coming back, "to have fun." Thank you so much to the Lutherhaven Board and Caretakers to allow us to use the facility.

Weekend Campouts



We went on multiple weekend overnight campouts. In February we went to the District Scout Klondike at Camp Parsons, near Brinnon, WA. The scouts spent the weekend practicing, teaching and demonstrating Scout Skills like building a fire which will light with one match, building a frame with tying poles together which the entire patrol can sit on. While demonstrating skills they had to work together as a team.

In March, we spent the weekend at Camp Piggott near Monroe, WA. The scouts spent the weekend learning fire arm safety and target shooting with everything from throwing knifes to shotguns. This event is definitely a favorite for multiple scouts.







In April, we spent the weekend at the District Camporee, near Port Gamble, WA. The scouts spent the weekend building fires, shooting BB-guns, and playing gaga ball.





In May, we visited King County and camped at the Tolt-McDonald Park & Campground. We found a nice hike which gave us a great view of the Snoqualmie River and the surrounding area. The scouts also stayed up late trying to catch a glimpse of the Northern Lights.





In June, we stayed at Joemma Beach State Park near Carnation, WA. This campout was the first time some scouts went canoeing in open water. We also had a great opportunity to look at some of the sea life due to a really low tide.



In July we spent one night camping out at a local property in near Silverdale, WA. The scouts spent the day playing card games, fishing, and playing frisbee.

In October, we camped at the Lutherhaven Campground. We invited Cub Scouts, looking to join Scouts BSA, to visit our troop and camp overnight with us. This gives the Cub Scouts an opportunity to see what Scouts BSA camping is all about. Also, they get to know us to and see if they would like to join our troop in the Spring. We spent the weekend playing games and passing down our outdoor skills and knowledge to the younger scouts.



In September, we went on our first back country backpacking campout since before 2020. We hiked about 2.5 miles to the Elkhorn Campground, on the Dosewallips River, near Brinnon, WA. The scouts learned many new skills like how to cook on small backpacking stoves and how to hang your food from a tree to protect it from wildlife.

Day Trips and Hikes

When we're not camping the scouts go on day activities. In November, we hiked the Ueland Tree Farm near Chico. This hike was one of the 10-mile prep hikes for the Hiking Merit Badge. In April, we took some time and had a swim party at the Bangor Submarine Base pool.



In August, we went to a Tacoma Rainers baseball game. It was BSA night and watched scouts from the local area perform the opening flag ceremony.



In September, we went on another 10-mile hike near Port Gamble



We topped it off in October with a 20-mile hike on the Olympic Discovery Trail near Sequim, WA. This was a huge achievement for the scouts, completing the Hiking Merit Badge. It was 6 hours on our feet with a break for lunch and an overall beautiful day.

Summer Camp

Summer Camp – Summer Camp is an event we do each summer. This year we took 11 scouts to Camp Meriwether near Tillamook, OR. This week-long experience is a time for memory making, for meeting new friends, learning new skills and exploring the great outdoors. Most of all, camp provides an opportunity for young people to take the lead, test their abilities and push their limits, all while having a blast. The scouts stayed very busy the whole week. This was the first time a couple scouts climbed a rock wall and they went sand surfing.



Advancements

Scouts are recognized and rewarded for each achievement which helps them gain self-confidence. The steps in the advancement system help a scout grow in self-reliance and in the ability to help others. This year, most of the scouts have earned at least one merit badge or rank this year. Many scouts have earned multiple merit badges.



This year we had three scouts, Adrian Tittle, Sam Bonsell and Reese Benza, attain the final rank in Scouts BSA, the rank of Eagle Scout. Most scouts take anywhere from 4 - 6 years on their journey to reaching the Eagle Scout rank. It consists of learning & teaching Scout Skills, earning more than 21 individual holding leadership merit badges, positions in the troop, and also requires well over 12 hours of community service. Being an Eagle Scout is important because requires immense hard dedication, and service to others. It gives teens something to strive for and instills leadership. confidence, commitment to the community. These skills carry into college, career, and adult life.



We also have other scouts who are near to completing Eagle rank. One scout has completed all his merit badges and another scout completed his Eagle Scout Project Leadership requirement. This requirement is the most challenging requirement for an Eagle Scout Candidate. They are required to Plan and Complete a Service Project benefiting their community. They have to plan the project, gain approval from community leaders, raise funds for materials, purchase materials, lead a team of scouts to complete, and finally write a report on the project and what they learned.



This is quite an undertaking for a young man age 17 or younger. The project consisted of refurbishing the sandbox in the Silverdale Lutheran Preschool Playground. The scouts cleaned and painted the box and finally replaced all the sand.



Service Opportunities

Service is one of the most important values we have in Scouting. The Scout Oath calls on us all to "help other people at all times." The Scout Law says a Scout is Helpful, Friendly, Courteous, Kind.

Each year for Veterans Day and Memorial Day we honor veterans by placing flags on veterans' grave markers at Forest Lawn Cemetery in Bremerton. This is a tradition we've held for many years and continued this year. We also perform a United States Flag Retirement ceremony on Veterans Day.





In April, the scouts supported a Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) Emergency Drill event. The scouts got the opportunity to be actors with various injuries during the drill. CERT volunteers really appreciate live actors to help provide a little more realism to their drills.

In May, we got the privilege to participate in the Bremerton Armed Forces Day Parade and the Viking Fest Parade with the Sons of Norway lodge in Bremerton.

We've had the opportunity to support Silverdale Lutheran Church in a couple ways this year. In October, we supported the SLC Treat Trail. In November, the scouts supported Gods Work our Hands. It was a great event to have the opportunity for the scouts to volunteer side by side other SLC members. In February, we made breakfast for the congregation on Scout Sunday. In July, we walked in the Whaling Days Parade with the SLC parade team. Over the summer we supported Lutherhaven by power washing off the picnic tables and the cement patio under the picnic pavilion.

We conducted our annual **Pinewood Derby** in March, and sent four cars to the District-level race!





We were able to support our local sports teams this year when they hosted Scout Nights: Sounders, Mariners, Rainiers, Silvertips, Seahawks, Thunderbirds, and for the first time, the Kraken! There was so much interest in the Kraken game that they held a second Scout Night! It has been so much fun introducing our Scouts to some new sports, and creating new fans!

After our Bridging Ceremony, the Pack returned to Twin Lakes for **Family Camp**. So many of our Cub Scouts attended **Day Camp** over the summer, we had to split them into two teams again! We are also excited for the new updates in this year's program!

Our Pack walked in the annual **Whaling Days Parade**—and our older Scouts brought their bikes! This year's **End of Summer Bash** and **Trunk or Treat** brought us new visitors and friends, too!

We just wrapped up **popcorn sales again**, and we sold over \$10,000! This money comes right back into Scouting, provides our supplies for the Scouting year, helps us do more of these fun activities, as well as give right back to our community. This year, we did **187 hours of community and conversation service**, including participation in the global Scouts Trash the Trash movement. We're currently gearing up for **Toys for Tots**, helping many local families, and our **Scouting for Food drive**, which will benefit **Central Kitsap Food Bank**.

In addition to our fully-loaded Den Leader team, we welcomed new Assistant Den Leaders multiple new Den Chiefs and two new Committee Members!

Venturing & SA

This past year, Crew 1548 has continued to accelerate our mountaineering program, and has stabilized our rhythm and function as a mid-size scouting unit.

Our roster currently boasts 22 youth (as compared to 17 a year ago), 16 of whom are active (as compared to 10 a year ago). As part of our effort to continue to grow, we have established new outreach mechanisms, including a partnership with Troop 1539, a large and influential local Boy Scout Troop, and are working to establish a partnership with the Juvenile Justice Program out of Tacoma.



So far this year, we've accumulated a total of 197 youth-nights of camping (as compared to 76 in all of 2023). Like last year, this includes trip in every month so far except March. Included in these trips are our first-ever events outside the state of Washington. We sent a couple youth (and accompanying adults) to Philmont Scout Ranch in New Mexico, and taking a road trip as a crew to climb Mt. Whitney in California. Also notable amongst our trips this year are successful summit bids on Mount Baker and The Brothers, and an unfortunately unsuccessful summit bid of Mount Rainier in July, which was cut short by a crevasse opening up the day before we were to summit.



The funds can also be used to purchase non-budgeted items such as pictures, bulletin boards, etc. to complete a project.



Island lake Cemetery

Island Lake Island Lake Cemetery is located at 12851 Old Military Road NE, Poulsbo, WA 98370.

The property was donated in December 1905 by Frank and Hanna Ekstedt to the founding Central Valley church body known as Island Lake Scandinavian Lutheran Church on Elk Lane off Central Valley Road.



Island Lake Cemetery is an integrated auxiliary of Silverdale Lutheran Church and holds services for the **Easter Sunrise Service** and the **Memorial Day Service**. The Cemetery committee are volunteers who operate and maintain the cemetery grounds.

- **Operations** include the sale of lots, recordkeeping and assistance to the church and families for services, including placement of urns and some headstones or markers.
- **Maintenance** includes regular mowing, trimming, seasonal cleanup and decoration cleanup.

Volunteers are greatly appreciated and may gain insight into local history.



2024 TREASURER'S REPORT

There are four positions associated with financial operations at Silverdale Lutheran Church. These positions are financial secretary, financial counters, bookkeeper, and treasurer.

Bruce Kramer serves as the financial secretary. Bruce receives all the offerings made via EFT (Electronic Fund Transfer) from SUPSPLASH or Simply Giving. He also records offering for each individual/household. The weekly counters provide Bruce with a report of the Sunday offering. He distributes a weekly deposit report to staff, Congregation President, Treasurer and Bookkeeper. Bradley Posadas will be taking over as financial Secretary.

Continuing this year, a financial team of several people have performed the role of offering counters. These people are: David Soine, Bob Arper, Karen McQuillan, Dee Cotter, and Mary Ramsey. This team rotates on a monthly basis to count and deposit the weekly offerings at Kitsap Bank. They provide a detailed sheet to Bruce for deposit report preparation and individual offering tabulation.

Rick Cotter has continued to serve as bookkeeper. In this capacity, Rick records the deposit reports into the SLC financial program (QuickBooks) and pays bills. In conjunction with the deposits, Rick uses offering/income data to maintain a benevolence worksheet and pays the benevolences at the end of each quarter. In addition, Rick processes payroll twice monthly which involves paying employees and submitting withholdings and payments to various state and federal agencies.

Cheryl Miller serves as the treasurer. The treasurer approves all expenditures and assures that all expenditures are in line with the budget developed by the council and approved by the congregation. The treasurer provides financial reports and recommendations to the trustees and council and assists them in budget development. The treasurer also works in close coordination with the bookkeeper to ensure all benevolences are paid on a quarterly basis and make sure that expenditures are charged to the appropriate budget line item.
